This year BAAT celebrates only two days short of the sixtieth anniversary of this great day.

Post-World War II geopolitics and self-interest of the Great Powers fragmented continents and divided countries. We saw two sets of Chinas, Koreas, Germanys and Vietnams. The subcontinent of India was divided into three countries.

Myanmar could have been on that list if not for the wisdom, fore-sight, and courage of those principals at Palaung on February 12, 1947.
