Background of Ni Ni Win Shwe

Modern Burmese music history cannot be written without mentioning Burma's rare vocal gem — the multi-talented Ni Ni Win Shwe (Ni Nj). She can sing different genres of Burmese music: western style songs (a.k.a. stereo songs or copy/pop songs), modern Burmese songs, pre and post-war songs, semi-classical songs and classical songs.

Ni Ni started out singing popular western songs made into Burmese songs which were known as "Stereo Songs" in her early teens. After recording about five to six successful solo albums, her producer persuaded her to sing Burmese songs which had authentic Burmese tunes. In fact, he mentioned the song, Pan Yee Ban Tike (literal meaning is Nectar Bank), for her new album. Note that this song is a signature song of famed vocalist Daw Khin Thit Lwin who was well respected by her vocalist peers.

It is worth describing about this song since its lyrics are very poetic and philosophical. The rhythm is so lively and varying. The melody is very pleasing. Therefore, to bring out the best of this song, it demands the superb singing technique and certain vocal range from one who dares to sing. However, a talented woman with beautiful voice who just happened to be in her late teens did not consider it too daunting. In fact, her rendition did total justice to the song that her name escalated into hall of fame after she released her version of that song. One can guess the name of that young woman.

Release of many successful solo and duet albums, decades of recording, live performances in Burma and abroad, TV and video appearances and three movies that she starred are testaments to her long and successful career starting from the 1980s. To date, she has recorded approximately 150 solo albums. About 50% percent of the songs she recorded were original songs composed for her. That distinguished her from other vocalists from her generation. (See Page 2)

BAAT and Newcomers

On March 12, 2010, two members of BAAT, U Min Jack Tham and Daw Aye Aye Kyi, spoke about their careers and career opportunities for students at the career symposium sponsored by Language Institute for Newcomers (LINC). LINC is an Alief ISD program which targets high-school age immigrant students and bridges their path to success by teaching or improving their skills in English while simultaneously starting their path toward graduation. This program services students who have been in the United States for one year or less at the time of enrollment. Currently, there are 141 students in the program, from twenty-six (26) countries and speaking thirteen (13) languages. Three most common languages identified by this program are Burmese, Vietnamese, and Spanish.
